

## Information from Uber Representatives

Regarding our Stance on fingerprinting -- as you know Uber requires in-depth information and documentation. To drive with Uber, all potential driver-partners must submit the following information:

- Full name
- Date of birth
- Social security number
- Copy of valid driver's license
  - To obtain a driver's license, you are required to provide proof of identity. For example, NJ has a six-point id verification system, which requires multiple documents such as a birth certificate, marriage certificate, and a passport among others. CA requires just a birth certificate or passport to verify your identity to get a driver's license.
- Valid vehicle registration
- Proof of valid insurance
- Valid bank account

With this in mind, fingerprints only verify identity for people who have previously submitted fingerprints, e.g. during an arrest, green card application, or other job screens. Millions of Americans do not have fingerprints on file. We need to have identity verification processes in place that are effective for everyone. Also, fingerprints do not verify that the person behind the wheel is the person who was screened. That's why it's so important to have technology in place to verify a driver's identity every time he or she logs into the app to drive.

Through Uber, riders on the service can see their driver's name, photo, and license plate number in the app. If their driver arrives and does not match the information provided, we ask the rider to not get into the car and to notify us of the issue. We can disable the driver's account immediately until the issue is resolved. Our real-time id check feature asks a driver to take a profile photo of themselves before being able to log in to give rides. That profile photo will be matched with the driver photo on file. If the photos don't match, the person will not be allowed access to the platform. Technologies like this can help ensure that the driver using the app always matches the account we have on file.
